NEW CDBG PROJECTS AWARDED ACROSS THE REGION

Several communities throughout the region will receive funding to help complete a variety of improvement projects. The funding comes from the Small Cities Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program administered by the Kansas Department of Commerce.

The City of Beloit will receive \$400,000 for a housing rehabilitation and demolition project. Other sources of funds will contribute \$42,000 to the project.

The City of Ellsworth will receive \$380,500 for a housing rehabilitation and demolition project. Other sources of funds will contribute \$19,500 to the project.

The City of Longford will receive \$360,000 for a housing rehabilitation and demolition project. Other sources of funds will contribute \$12,000 to the project.

The City of Chapman will receive \$300,000 for a street and drainage

improvement project. The city will provide a match of \$200,000.

The City of Sylvan Grove will receive \$157,490 for a street improvement project. The city will provide a match of \$156,190.

The City of Cuba will receive \$312,000 for a water system improvement project. The city will provide a match of \$579,523.

To receive CDBG funds, local government units must meet at least one of three program objectives: benefit low and moderate-income persons, prevent or eliminate slums and blight, or resolve an urgent need where local resources are not available to do so.

One community in the region will benefit from Kansas Small Towns Environment Program (KAN STEP) funding. The KAN STEP program also is administered by the Kansas Department of Commerce. Dickinson County will receive \$299,998 to

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renovate an obsolete school building in the unincorporated town of Navarre. The improved building will continue to serve as the focal point of this rural community, sponsoring 4-H meetings, family reunions, Coop meetings and other activities. KAN STEP funds will be used in conjunction with volunteer labor and donated equipment to complete the project.

Planning for FY 2015 CDBG funding is well underway. Program eligibility for the categories of Community Facilities, Water & Sewer, Housing, KAN STEP, Commercial Rehabilitation, and Urgent Need, was discussed at the CDBG Annual Application Workshop, which took place in Lyons on April 17. NCRPC staff attended the workshop and is ready to help with your project planning needs. Contact the NCRPC for assistance. Application deadlines are listed on page 2.

FY 2015 CDBG Housing Program has Changes

Two important changes are being implemented for the housing category of the Small Cities Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Program for FY 2015 applications.

First, applicants will have the opportunity to make application at one of two maximum levels. The maximum grant amount is \$300,000 for a single-family/ owner-occupied or rental rehabilitation and/or demolition application. The maximum grant amount is \$400,000 if an applicant wishes to explore other opportunities and submits an application that expands outside these basic activities.

The second change is that five points will now be deducted from the applicant's score if they did not attend a Housing Interagency Advisory Committee (HIAC) meeting in the last two years. When the HIAC was first introduced, attendance was encouraged but not required. The core group of the HIAC consists of federal and state agencies involved in the financing of housing including Kansas Department of Commerce, Kansas Housing Resources Corporation, and U.S. Department of Agriculture/Rural Development. The HIAC typically meets monthly from March through July. A community must submit a Housing Profile and a completed Housing Assessment Tool (HAT) to Commerce before an appointment will be scheduled.

Regional Homeland Security Councils Remain Active Across Kansas

Have you heard about Regional Homeland Security (RHS) Councils? Do you know who represents your county on your council and what work is being done to help your county prepare for disaster, disaster response and community economic recovery? It is storm season, but a lot of other economic and community continuity concerns are on the front burners of our lives, as well.

RHS Councils were developed in late 2006 during the Federal Fiscal Year 2006 funding cycle as a way to maximize the productivity of the Homeland Security dollars coming into Kansas. This enabled a regional approach for risk assessments and to greatly aid with disaster response and recovery capabilities.

The multi-disciplinary council in each region has representatives from fire/hazardous-material agencies, emergency medical services, law enforcement, emergency management, public health, hospitals, public works, emergency communications, agriculture, non-profit volunteer agencies and counties across the region. The North Central Regional Homeland Security Council includes the following counties: Smith, Jewell, Republic, Osborne, Mitchell, Cloud, Clay, Ottawa, Lincoln, Ellsworth, Saline and Dickinson. Washington and Marshall counties are part of the Northeast RHS Region. The RHS Councils are tasked with identifying the Homeland Security priorities for each region and what funding can be used to assist with those activities.



assist with those Carlos Rodriguez, Hazardous Material Specialist of the Wichita Fire Department, led a Hazardous Material IQ training at the NCRPC office in January 2013. Training is one of the many activities of the Regional Homeland Security Councils.

The NCRPC acts as the Fiscal Agent

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for six of the seven designated Homeland Security Regions in Kansas and has been an active partner in all of the North Central RHS Council planning activities. Most of the county emergency managers in the North Central region have been active in the regional planning process, meetings and decisions that develop the funding priorities and projects for the region.

Ask your Emergency Manager about past projects and on-going sustainment of current projects in our region. With the assistance of the

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minister housing rehabilitation projects on a part-time basis. Carol Torkelson, NCRPC Housing Director, says the two have a vast amount of experience in housing.

"Connie and Jeff were instrumental in developing our Housing Department," Torkelson says. "Many across the state recognize their expertise and they have been mentors to a number of individuals as well."
